A Merry Meadow Croft Christmas

Garland and lights glistened up the wooden banisters of the grand staircase while music continued to filter in from the Roosevelt piano, mingling with the sounds of dozens of visitors as they shouldered their way inside the foyer and out of the cold. Christmas had finally returned to Meadow Croft, and its presence glowed throughout every corner of the former John Elis Roosevelt estate.

The unmistakable smell of vanilla grew stronger the closer you came to the kitchen, where on the dining room table, a set of festive place settings waited for the arrival of Christmas dinner. It's the very same table, Head Docent Jerry McCluskey is bound to mention, that once sat the 26th President of the United States Theodore Roosevelt as he dined with his cousins. The attention here paid to the historical details are matched with an effort to create a warm and inviting atmosphere, complete with artificial flames glowing in the cast iron stove. The result makes Meadow Croft feel more home than museum, as if it's still lived in today. All the more so, on the first weekend in December when Christmas trees adorned nearly every room and laughter filled the halls as it once must have.

Situated a stone throw from the Sayville-Bayport border along Middle Road, these days the historical building and grounds of the estate are a part of the Suffolk County Parks Department and home to its caretakers, the Bayport Blue Point Heritage Association, who have carefully restored the Isaac Green original. A Christmas at Meadow Croft is the Heritage Association's largest undertaking of the year, bringing through its doors an estimated 800 people over two days.

It's no small feat. The entire weekend is the product of a dedicated army of volunteers, led by Heritage events chairperson Leanne Berg and President Mary Bailey, who clean and decorate over 21 rooms, the exterior, the auto house, and carriage house. It's there

Before the 2021 season even started, there was an anticipation that the BBP football team would have a strong team. With some great talent, and lots of hard work and dedication, it became a season to remember. For the first time in almost 2 decades, the Phantoms football team made it to the county championship.

Helmed by junior Brady Clark at quarterback, and seniors Jameson Smith at wide receiver and Gavin LoCascio at running back, the team finished the regular season with only 1 loss and went into the playoffs as the #2 seed in Division IV. Big crowds turned out to watch the games including a huge homecoming upset of the first place Shoreham-Wading River team. Of the fans that turned out this year, Coach Mike Zafonte said: "community turnout always helps. There is no doubt about that, the '12th person' is definitely a thing."

After playoff wins against John Glenn and then Mt. Sinai (the only team that beat them in the regular season) the Phantoms earned their way to the Suffolk County Championship game. Once again, they had to face their division rival Shoreham-Wading River. On a cold Friday night, BBP fans packed LaValle Stadium at SUNY Stony Brook and cheered on the team for a nail-biting 4 quarters. However, the Wildcats were not going to give in that easily and the game ended with BBP trailing by 3 points. While the loss still stings a bit, Coach Zafonte had nothing but praise for this team. When asked what made this group special, he said that "they were incredibly talented.

The Saturday after Thanksgiving saw the return of the Patchogue River Christmas Boat Parade, the first of its kind on Long Island when it began 28 years ago. Thousands showed up despite the cold, lining the banks of the Patchogue River, to wait for the decked out sea vessels that signify the start of the holiday season here on the South Shore. The holiday mainstay originated with the Oar Steak and Seafood Grill's Dick Blakeslee. This year's parade theme was "A Christmas Movie", and boy did our nautical community deliver.

I first submitted this photo of a Northern Cardinal for the October issue of the Gazette. But the month of September was so filled with loss in our community that the issue never came out.

The Northern Cardinal, as most know, it is a year-round resident on Long Island. However, it has become a symbol of our winter holiday season. Perhaps this is because it's bright red colors stand out against the backdrop of snow laden evergreens. However, there is a legend that says that when you see a Cardinal, it's a visit from a departed loved one. Whenever I tell my niece that I saw a Cardinal in my yard, she always responds with, "Did you tell Grandpa I said, 'Hello'?" I guess I am blessed, because I have quite a few Cardinals living around my house and they are frequent visitors to my feeders. My problem is that, while I can tell the bright red male Cardinal from the grayish/brownish red female, I can't tell which of my departed loved one's is visiting me: they all look the same. So I find myself going through the list of those who it might be: is this my father or one of my grandparents? my aunt or uncle? Maybe it's a friend or one of those loving persons who was like another parent to me. It could be a deeply missed neighbor or a cherished mentor. There are so many people who have flown into my life, caught my attention as they sang their song for awhile and have since flown on. And maybe that's the point of the tradition of the Cardinal, that seeing one grants us the opportunity to remember all of those who have touched upon and helped shape our lives.

Back in September, when I first submitted this photo, the slogan often spoken was "Never Forget". Perhaps the slogan for the Cardinal should be "Always Remember". So let us vow this holiday season to remember those who have passed through our lives bringing us joy, love and happiness. Though we wish that they could still be with us, let us celebrate their precious time we had with them and be grateful for all that they were to us.

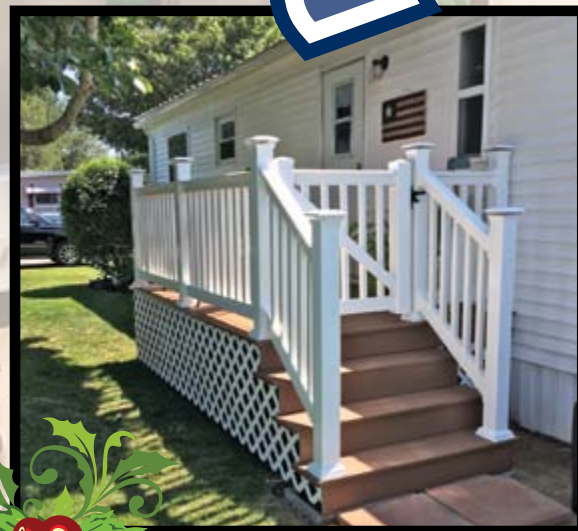

Building on the last few seasons, the BBP girls tennis team started this season with high expectations. Starting in fall 2021, they broke the county into a small school division and a large school division.

According to Coach Scharf, the secret to the team's success is commitment and support. "After the 2020 season (played in spring 2021), there was never really an off-season for this team because either players were training every day on their own, or they were working at our Learn & Play Camp, teaching tennis and playing before and after camp," Coach said. He also stated that the support that the girls give each other is also key to their accomplishments. He said, "a lot of tennis teams tend to be a bunch of individuals who are concerned with their own match and that's it. The girls on our team care as much about their teammates' matches as they do their own." He receives many compliments from opposing coaches and parents regarding the support the girls show for each other.

The future of the program is promising. Both the boys and girls tennis teams are the #1 seeds going into their next season. Between the summer Learn & Play camp for the younger players in town, the building of the new courts at the middle school and the addition of a middle school team, the BBP tennis program looks to be strong for many years to come.

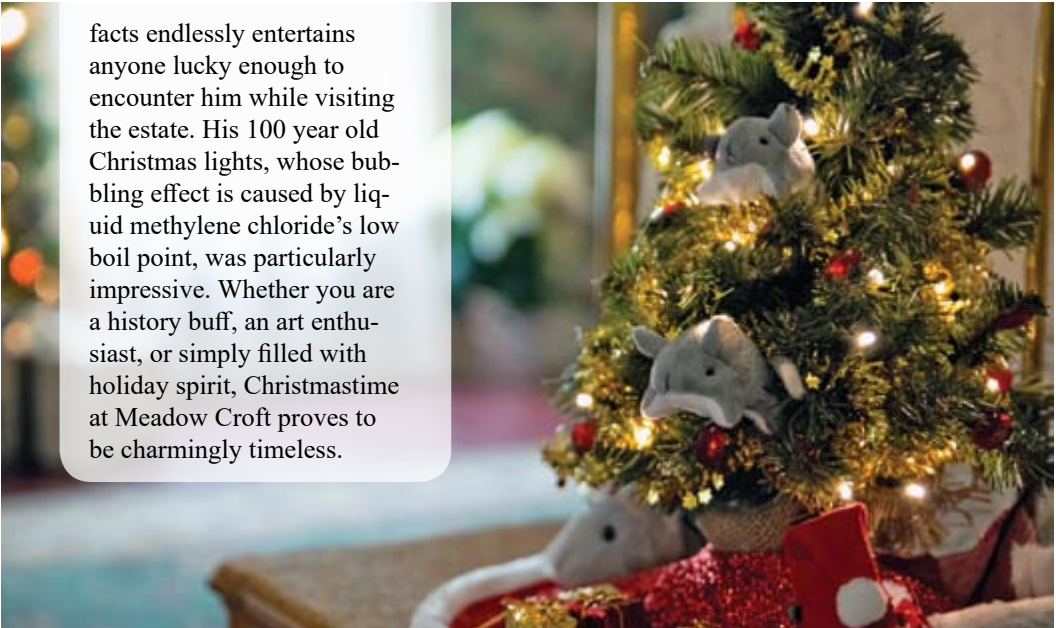

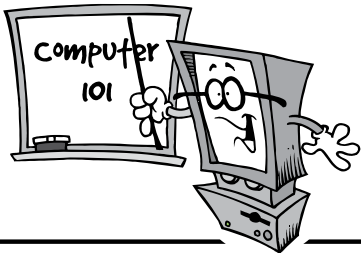

pc Help101

Hello readers,

With the holidays fast approaching most of us are scurrying around our homes making sure the house is all clean for decorating and for all the company we'll be having. One item you need to be careful about when cleaning is your flat screen TV and computer monitors and laptops.

TVs can be dust and fingerprint magnets. It's only natural to grab some paper towels and some Windex and start to clean. STOP, never ever use Windex on your TV screen as it's an easy way to permanently damage the screen. All modern TVs have special coatings on their surface that can be ruined by strong cleaners.

The short version- don't use liquids, don't press too hard, and don't use any traditional cleaners. Microfiber cloths are good but be gentle. Modern TVs are predominantly plastic and therefore easier to scratch than windows or even your phone screen. Many new TVs ship with a soft cloth for cleaning the screen. If you've tossed or lost this cloth, it's similar to the kind that comes with pairs of glasses and sunglasses.

Want the long version? Here's what three top TV manufacturers say about cleaning their screens. LG Cleaning your 4K, OLED or LED TV screen with a soft dry cloth is recommended. The goal is to avoid scratching the screen. Gentle circular motions tend to give better results since the circular motion hits each area from several angle in a single swipe. Never use chemicals such as alcohol, thinners or benzene and don't spray water or other liquids on the TV as electric shock could occur. SAMSUNG Turn the TV off and let it cool down before unplugging it. (This is a good practice with any brand of TV.) To clean the frame and screen very gently wipe it with a microfiber cleaning cloth. Screens are fragile and can be damaged when pressed too hard. If you don't see the desired results use distilled water, not tap water on the microfiber cleaning cloth and very gently wipe it in a circular motion. Let dry completely before plugging it back in. SONY Gently wipe the screen or exterior with a dry, soft cloth such as an eye-glass cleaning cloth. If ink from oil markers is on the screen use a very diluted non-soap synthetic cleanser with water. Do not use excess liquid and dry immediately with a clean, soft cloth.

So why do I tell you not to use Windex? Windex is formulated for glass windows and contains ammonia and alcohol., two no-no's for TV screens. If you don't have luck with a simple soft dry cloth, there are many companies who make cleaners for screens and are 99% water and 1% other stuff (presumably safe to use.) Always read the ingredients making sure to never use ammonia or alcohol. The bottom line never use any type of window cleaner, soap, powders, abrasives. Never spray water directly on screen only wet the cloth if necessary and wipe gently and in a circular motion.

Well, we've come to the end of another year and hopefully we have managed to stay safe and healthy. I hope all my readers have a very Merry Christmas and happy holiday season and that the new year continues to bring us good health.
