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A Merry Meadow Croft Christmas

Garland and lights glistened up the wooden banisters of the grand staircase while music continued to filter in from the Roosevelt piano, mingling with the sounds of dozens of visitors as they shouldered their way inside the foyer and out of the cold.

Christmas had finally returned to Meadow Croft, and it's presence glowed throughout every corner of the former John Elis Roosevelt estate.

The unmistakable smell of vanilla grew stronger the closer you came to the kitchen, where on the dining room table, a set of festive place settings waited for the arrival of Christmas dinner. It's the very same table, Head Docent Jerry Mc-Cluskey is bound to mention, that once sat the 26th President of the United States Theodore Roosevelt as he dined with his cousins. The attention here paid to the historical details are matched with an effort to create a warm and inviting atmosphere, complete with artificial flames glowing in the cast iron stove. The result makes Meadow Croft feel more home that



makes Meadow Croft feel more home than museum, as if it's still lived in today. All the more so, on the first weekend in December when Christmas trees adorned nearly every room and laughter filled the halls as it once must have.

Situated a stone throw from the Sayville-Bayport border along Middle Road, these days the historical building and grounds of the estate are a part of the Suffolk County Parks Department and home to it's caretakers, the Bayport Blue Point Heritage Association, who have carefully restored the Isaac Green original. A Christmas at Meadow Croft is the Heritage Association's largest undertaking of the year, bringing through its doors an estimated 800 people over two days.

It's no small feat. The entire weekend is the product of a dedicated army of volunteers, led by Heritage events chairperson Leanne Berg and President Mary Bailey, who clean and decorate over 21 rooms, the exterior, the auto house, and carriage house. It's there continued on page 16

On a cold Friday night, BBP fans packed LaValle Stadium at SUNY Stony Brook and cheered on the team for a nailbiting 4 quarters. However, the Wildcats were not going to give in that easily and the game ended with BBP trailing by 3 points. While the loss still stings a bit, Coach Zafonte had nothing but praise for this team. When asked what made this group special, he said that "they were incredibly talented. continued on page 19

Always around to lend a paw, Ginger Smith helped St. Ann's Church set a record with over 500 trees sold on the very first day of their annual Christmas Tree sale!



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
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BBP Girls Tennis Takes the County Championship By Karen Costa

Building on the last few seasons, the BBP girls tennis team started this season with high expectations. By the end of the season, they won the league and county championships and earned their way to the Long Island Championship. The team went undefeated during the regular season and was the #1 seed heading into the playoffs. After beating Shelter Island/Greenport, they then beat Shoreham-Wading River to win the Suffolk County small schools title. The next step of their journey was to face Friends Academy for the Long Island Championship. Despite their efforts and talent, they couldn't pull off that win against a very tough FA team.

Coach Keith Scharf explained some history of the girls tennis program. In 2019 and 2020 (played in spring 2021) BBP's girls tennis team had won the division III title for the first and second times in the school's history. At that point there was only 1 playoff bracket for all the county schools, large and small combined, and they had to play against schools like Ward Melville and Sachem, so it was an even bigger hurdle for a small school like BBP to win those titles. Starting in fall 2021, they broke the county into a small school division and a large school division.

According to Coach Scharf, the secret to the team's success is commitment and support. "After the 2020 season (played in spring 2021), there was never really an off-season for this team because either players were training every day on their own, or they were working at our Learn & Play Camp, teaching tennis and playing before and after camp," Coach said. He also stated that the support that the girls give each other is also key to their accomplishments. He said, "a lot of tennis teams tend to be a bunch of individuals who are concerned with their own match and that's it. The girls on our team care as much about their teammates' matches as they do their own." He receives many compliments from opposing coaches and parents regarding the support the girls show for each other.

The future of the program is promising. Both the boys and girls tennis teams are the #1 seeds going into their next season. Between the summer Learn & Play camp for the younger players in town, the building of the new courts at the middle school and the addition of a middle school team, the BBP tennis program looks to be strong for many years to come.

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A Season for Poinsettias

busy soaking up the sunshine at the beach, our Christmas crop has just kicked off it's 24-30 week journey to bloom into the holiday decoration you see today.

Native to Central America, poinsettias are the namesake of former congressmen Joel Poinsett, the first U.S Ambassador to Mexico, who introduced the festively colored shrub to the States during a visit back home in the late 1820s. In the years following, he gifted them to his friends and family, sparking the tradition we carry to this day. "Why is a sub-tropical plant our staple Christmas plant?" you ask. Well it's all about bloom time. While every Poinsettia starts off green regardless of the variety, their foliage transitions to its full vibrant color just in time for the start of our holiday season. Though Poinsettias give off the appearance of a "flower", those beautiful colors are actually a Bract, or modified leaf. And over the years, they've come a long way!

If I were to ask my grandfather what Poinsettias looked like, he would say "They're mostly red with some white colored ones available." Ask me, and I'd tell you we now have about any variation you could imagine from bright pinks, to peach, to cream, to pure white and multiple shades of red in between. Growing and selling our plants locally, without having to ship them, allows them to fully mature into the larger, fuller, and healthier product you recognize around town all season. To see what I mean check out the Gazette's gallery of some of our most popular options below and stop into our greenhouses to be introduced to the full range of our poinsettia crop. Helpful Care Tips for keeping your poinsettias looking beautiful all winter long: Keep indoors (65 to 72 degrees) near a window with bright light (south facing is best). Water with a heavy soaking once a week. Be sure to keep away from any drafty

For the first time this period piece Santa Claus is played by Tom Maher, who took up the mantle this year from his father, the original Meadow Croft St. Nick. For those still in



need of holiday presents there were raffle baskets up for grabs and gifts available to purchase. The yearly holiday open house has taken place for over 30 years, with the notable exception being 2020, and serves as both a fundraiser for the association and a farewell for the winter, after which guided tours won't return until June. Despite the opulent trappings of wealth, being in Meadow Croft during Christmastime tells the tale of a simpler time. On display in one of the seven upstairs bedrooms were painted miniature houses made from cigar boxes, just the thing a child might unwrap on Christmas in 1910 and a far cry from the new iphones many of us asked for this year. The first artificial christmas trees, crafted out of split goosefeathers dyed

green to resemble pine needles, are scaled down versions of their modern day counterparts.

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With the holidays fast approaching most of us are scurrying around our homes making sure the house is all clean for decorating and for all the company we'll be having. One item you need to be careful about when cleaning is your flat screen TV and computer monitors and laptops.

TVs can be dust and fingerprint magnets. It's only natural to grab some paper

towels and some Windex and start to clean. STOP, never ever use Windex on your TV screen as it's an easy way to permanently damage the screen. All modern TVs have special coatings on their surface that can be ruined by strong cleaners.

The short

version- don't use liquids, don't press too hard, and don't use any traditional cleaners. Microfiber cloths are good but be gentle. Modern TVs are predominantly plastic and therefore easier to scratch than windows or even your phone screen. Many new TVs ship with a soft cloth for cleaning the screen. If you've tossed or lost this cloth, it's similar to the kind that comes with pairs of glasses and sunglasses.

Want the long version? Here's what three top TV manufacturers say about cleaning their screens.

LG Cleaning your 4K, OLED or LED TV screen with a soft dry cloth is recommended. The goal is to avoid scratching the screen. Gentle circular motions tend to give better results since the circular motion hits each area from several angle in a single swipe. Never use chemicals such as alcohol, thinners or benzene and don't spray water or other liquids on the TV as electric shock could occur. SAMSUNG Turn the TV off and let it cool down before unplugging it. (This is a good practice with any brand of TV.) To clean the frame and screen very gently wipe it with a microfiber cleaning cloth. Screens are fragile and can be damaged when pressed too hard. If you don't see the desired results use distilled water, not tap water on the microfiber cleaning cloth and very gently wipe it in a circular motion. Let dry completely before plugging it back in.

SONY Gently wipe the screen or exterior with a dry, soft cloth such as an eyeglass cleaning cloth. If ink from oil markers is on the screen use a very diluted non-soap synthetic cleanser with water. Do not use excess liquid and dry immediately with a clean, soft cloth.

So why do I tell you not to use Windex? Windex is formulated for glass windows and contains ammonia and alcohol., two no-no's for TV screens. If you don't have luck with a simple soft dry cloth, there are many companies who make cleaners for screens and are 99% water and 1% other stuff (presumably safe to use.) Always read the ingredients making sure to never use ammonia or alcohol. The bottom line never use any type of window cleaner, soap, powders, abrasives. Never spray water directly on screen only wet the cloth if necessary and wipe gently and in a circular motion.


